

HISTORY OF PUBLIC HEALTH IN THE UNITED STATES (HS 231)

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Course Requirements

(1) Two 5-7 page (typed, double-spaced) papers. (More instructions on final page of syllabus.)

The first will be on: Madonna Swan, A Lakota Woman's Story, as told through Mark St. Pierre (Norman: University of Oklahoma Press, 1991). (Due **Feb 9**)

Choose one of the two following books for the second: (Due **March 16**)

Alice Wexler, Mapping Fate: A Memoir of Family, Risk, and Genetic Research (NY: Random House, 1995).

Paul K. Longmore, Why I Burned My Book and Other Essays on Disability (Philadelphia: Temple University Press, 2003) (Any 8 of the 13 essays)

(2) Brief response papers. At the beginning of each class session, students should hand in a brief discussion (2-4 pages typed) of the readings for that day. The papers should answer the following questions: What are the main points made by the author in each selection? Which examples supporting those points were most compelling to you? Which were the least compelling? These papers will not be graded individually but will contribute toward the final grade for class participation. (These papers are not required for either the first or last class session.)

(4) Class participation and discussion of readings. By 10 A.M. of the day of each class, send two or more discussion questions to abel@ucla.edu
